OVERVIEW

The *International Summer School, New Delhi* (ISS, <u>www.issnewdelhi.in</u>) is an intensive, six-week academic programme that brings together students from all over the world over the course of a summer in the national capital of India – the world's largest democracy and one of its fastest growing major economies.

An initiative backed by the New Delhi-based *Centre for Escalation of Peace* (CEP, www.cepeace.org), the programme is convened annually under the banner of the Government's acclaimed *Incredible !ndia* campaign and with the crucial support of the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA).

The ISS aims at promoting international goodwill and cross-cultural dialogue amongst promising young individuals, developing their potential as future leaders in government, business and civil society. With India as a study model, it offers undergraduate course modules and experiences that introduce the students to a range of issues and debates that are shaping contemporary developing societies.

With around 40 students representing 20 different countries and some of the world's leading universities, the programme successfully concluded its fourth session on Friday 5 August 2016 after six weeks of lectures, seminars, workshops, excursions, cultural experiences and volunteering activities.



OVERVIEW

Course modules at the ISS include Indian Politics, The Indian Economy, Indian Sociology and Indian History. The faculty delivering lectures as part of these modules come from institutions such as JNU, Delhi University, Ambedkar University and the South Asian University, among others. A fifth module, Fieldwork, allows students to engage with India through workshops and a volunteer experience, building on the knowledge gained from the other four modules.

The academic syllabus at the ISS is supplemented by seminars scheduled throughout the programme where students are able to interact with eminent speakers on topics that are relevant to the nation and its people. A short course on the Hindi language at a beginner's level is also part of the programme. Visits to sites that showcase India's rich culture and heritage are also planned over the course of the programme, including excursions to Agra and Jaipur.

Since 2013, we have successfully held four sessions of the ISS. In this time, the programme has had representation from countries such as Japan, Mexico, South Africa, the United States of America (USA), China, the Philippines, Syria, Australia, Turkey, Italy, Morocco, Germany, Malaysia, Denmark, Iran, Turkmenistan, Thailand, the United Kingdom (UK), Bangladesh, Colombia, Uzbekistan, Iraq, the Kingdom of Bhutan, Tajikistan, Fiji, Yemen, Nigeria, Nepal, Lao PDR, Norway, Sri Lanka, Palestine, Afghanistan and Indonesia apart from students originating from different states and regions of India.



OVERVIEW

Many of these participants have been students at some of the top institutions of the world with which the ISS has formal collaborations and/or arrangements in place, with the University of California, the University of Oxford, the University of Tokyo, National University of Singapore, the University of Adelaide and the Royal University of Bhutan being just a few among them.

The ISS is also the beneficiary of crucial assistance from the Ministry of External Affairs in the form of country or region-specific scholarships, including ten India-ASEAN Goodwill Scholarships that are facilitated by the ASEAN Secretariat in Jakarta. Additionally, the India-Bhutan Foundation and the High Commission of India in Dhaka extend their kind support in order to establish scholarships for two students each from Bhutan and Bangladesh, respectively.

2016 ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

The academic programme, based at Jawaharlal Nehru University, consisted of lectures in:

i. Indian History

(Coordinator: Dr. Ruchika Sharma, Sri Venkateswara College, University of Delhi)

ii. Indian Economics

(Coordinator: Dr. Arindam Banerjee, Ambedkar University)

iii. Indian Sociology

(Coordinator: Dr Tanweer Fazal, Jawaharlal Nehru University)

iv. Indian Politics

(Coordinator: Dr. Sucharita Sengupta, Jamia Millia Islamia – A Central University).

Each module comprised of 12 lectures and over the course of the lectures, the students studied under renowned professors from leading educational establishments from across Delhi.



2016 ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

During the academic programme, students studied the past, present and future of India across a wide range of domains; this not only allowed them to critically engage with how India has arrived at its present, but also to consider where the future would lead. In addition to these modules, students took introductory classes in Hindi, which served them well during their time in Delhi, as well as with communicating with locals during their fieldwork in Jhalawar.

Students were required to write an essay for each of the four modules, which allowed them to further review and consolidate the knowledge gained during their lectures. These essays gave students the opportunity to distil what they had learned during their academic experiences, as well considering how the theory translates into practice, something which they witnessed in Jhalawar.


2016 FIELDWORK

Aside from their academics, the students were given an insight into civil society during the two-week fieldwork programme, when they volunteered in the town of Jhalawar in Rajasthan.

This aspect of the programme was organised in close collaboration with the Delhibased NGOs Ritinjali (an organisation which runs social improvement and education programmes) and 5waraj (a cultural association which seeks to preserve Indian culture).

The fieldwork sought to introduce students to rural India, its local governance and its education system, each of which they had all studied over the course over the first four weeks. Upon reflection, the students all felt as though their understanding of India had been veritably enriched by this experience.

During these two weeks, the students were either volunteering in government schools in the small villages of Munderi and Bagher, or in the Pallavan schools in Jhalawar itself. They were given the freedom to plan their lessons, meaning that their interactions with the school pupils were guided by their own passions and were as enriching as possible; the activities conducted by students ranged from introductory Japanese classes to sessions on women's empowerment.

After classes, the students had the opportunity to interact with pupils, teachers and villagers - and with the help of their Hindi-speaking peers, were able to learn a significant amount about life in rural India, further augmenting their understanding.

Students considered these interactions to be significantly meaningful, as they were able to form bonds with people whose lives were so different from their own - and were incredibly grateful of the hospitality that they received in each home that they invited into.

Furthermore, students were able to explore and discover the rich history and culture of Jhalawar- activities including an interaction with the local historian Mr. Lalit Sharma; a visit to a shrine to listen to *Qawaalis*; performances of traditional music and dance; and a visit to the Palace of Jhalawar.

After the conclusion of the programme, students spent two days discovering Jaipur, before returning to Delhi and departing for their respective countries.

CARLOTTA Italy



Thailand






